

Margaret Pritchard—Obituary (1929-2017)

Margaret Pritchard was born on September 18, 1929 right before the stock market crash. She had rheumatic fever and polio when she was young, and suffered from the complications of polio until her death on July 29, 2017. She lived in Milwaukie, Oregon all her life, whenever she wasn't traveling.

Her career was in consulting engineering, which was unusual for a woman at that time. She specialized in applying industry specific technologies to other industries to engineer a solution. If she ran into a problem she needed additional expertise on, she had many friends to call on for help. Her international consulting engineering firm specialized in energy, food, and wastewater. She worked in Canada, Italy, Bermuda, England, and in each of the 50 states, which resulted in her being a member of the first ever "frequent flyer" program. She was an active member of the Society of Women Engineers, American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and the American Society of Engineering Management, as well as several food industry societies. And, of course, she was a member of the Welsh Society in Portland.

The blood line on her father's side (the Pritchards) goes clear back to the 15th century in Wales. The family house at the time, Llancaiach Fawr Manor, is still run as a National Trust in Wales. The manor has a theatre featuring a 2-hour play about the family, as well as a blacksmith shop, a bakery, and a scullery. The whole thing is run as if it were the year 1643.

She brought a photograph of her great grandfather with her when she was traveling in Wales. The proprietor of the bed and breakfast she stayed in said, "I've got a friend named Pritchard who lives down the way. Let me call her and we can go for tea." So she went to the Pritchard house for tea and met the Pritchard lady's husband. The lady's husband, however, was skeptical, and said, "This Yank over here thinks she's part of my wife's family." Then he got up from the tea table and excused himself. When he came back he had an 8 ½ x 11 photograph which he put on the table face down. "Now, if you belong to this family," he said, "You can tell me some characteristics of this man." Margaret didn't know who it was, but she said, "Well, if he's family, he's got a cleft chin. He's got a dimple on his left cheek. He has flying eyebrows and a widow's peak, and he's supernumerary." Then the husband tuned the picture over. Margaret's great grandfather and the man in the picture, who was the Pritchard lady's grandfather, could have been twins. Everything that she had said was there: the cleft chin, the left dimple, and the extra fingers.

Now, in Wales there is a saying, which goes, "Put all your troubles in a box and sit on the lid and laugh and sing." And of course she did all those.

A celebration of her life will be held on Sunday, August 27th at 2 pm at Rose Villa Senior Living, 13505 S.E. River Road, Portland, OR.

Although this site has not been updated since 2013, the links that still work are fun to explore. Just Picture It—Wales is an attempt to gather in one place links to multiple websites with photos of places in Wales. The photos range from over 100 years old to modern photos of old places.

The links are arranged in alphabetical order by the site name rather than the place name, so look at the whole list to find what interests you.

Of the 47 sites listed, 13 links don't work or take you to a different website.

Cardiffians leads to the dreaded 404 error, but just click on "home" and you'll find the photos.

For Dyfed Archaeological Trust, click on "Projects" to get to some photos of the area. The website is more information than photos, but interesting information.

The Old UK Photos link has a link to Wales on its home page that will lead to more detailed options for photos.

Percy Benzie Abery was a photographer in Wales, and this link takes you to the National Library of Wales and some digitized photos. We'll explore more of NLW in another issue.

Several of the sites include extensive historical text in addition to the photos.

It's a shame this website has not been kept up as it has such great potential for seeing places we may never be able to travel to see. The historic photos are always interesting, and even if we could travel, we'd need a time machine.

'Wales on Rails: fine foods and great views on the Holyhead to Cardiff' an article from the Guardian

"The Gerald of Wales, which runs the length of the country, is a rarity: a train with an onboard chef serving three-course meals and proper morning fry-ups."

This article from the Guardian describes the rail service that runs from Holyhead on Angelsey, across the northern part of Wales, then south along the border with England to finish at Cardiff. Follow the link to see the full article describing the unique features of this particular service:

"Running from Holyhead, on to Bangor and then down to Cardiff every weekday morning, and back again in the evening, it is one of only two trains in the UK that still has an onboard chef cooking full breakfasts and three-course dinners. (The only other train route where freshly-cooked daytime and evening meals are served is on a small selection of the London to Devon and Cornwall trains run by First Great Western)."

"It would be difficult to think of a cosier place to be on a misty morning than in these immense grey seats, sipping freshly brewed coffee as the train passes slate-roofed villages and crumbling dry stone walls before trundling alongside the vanilla sands of the seaside towns of Colwyn Bay, Llandudno and Rhyl."
