Ancient Oak Falls in High Winds

A fierce storm on the night of April 17-18 brought down an ancient oak that had shaded the Ceiriog Valley since the year 802. The <u>Pontfadog Oak</u> (near Llangollen) was recently covered in heavy snow, and has now blown over in high winds. The oak is said to

have been the rallying point for Welsh prince Owain Gwynned's army, which defeated England's King Henry II in 1157. The tree was spared eight years later when Henry had his men cut down the Ceiriog woods. Its massive trunk, which grew to 42 feet in girth, had been largely hollowed out by decay. "It was always a working tree, pollarded or pruned for its wood. It was part of the community. People built houses from it, cooked from it. That's why it lived so long - it always had a role," said Moray Simpson, tree officer for Wrexham county borough council. After the tourists had left from seeing the fallen tree, about 30 locals from the valley gathered. "It was like a wake. We raised a glass to it," said Dianne Coakley-Williams, whose family heard the nighttime final crack. http://www.guardian.co.uk/environment/2013/apr/28/pontfadog-oak-revered-loved-mourned

Did you know that an important segment of Welsh American migration followed the **tinplate-production industry**? America's 1890 McKinley Tariff raised prices of imported tinplate, throwing the Welsh industry into chaos, and drawing hundreds of workers from Wales to its new tinplate industry, centered in Philadelphia and Ohio. PAUL ROBESON and WELSH COAL MINERS

Paul Robeson (1898-1976) was one of the foremost African-Americans of the twentieth century. He was a world renowned singer and actor, and a leading civil rights activist.

Robeson's association with South Wales dates from 1928 when, while performing in Show Boat in London's East End, he met a group of unemployed coal miners who had walked to London to draw attention to the hardship and suffering endured by thousands of unemployed miners and their families in South Wales. Robeson visited South Wales many times between 1929 and 1939, singing in various towns including Cardiff, Neath and Swansea. In 1938, he sang to the 7,000 people attending the Welsh International Brigades Memorial at Mountain Ash to commemorate the 33 Welshmen who had died in Spain. He told the audience,"I am here because I know that these fellows fought not only for me but for the whole world. It is my duty to be here." Robeson's links with South Wales were reinforced when in 1939, he starred in *The Proud Valley*, a film about life in a mining community in the Rhondda.

Each year between 1952 and 19547, Robeson was invited to sing at the Miners' Eisteddfod in Porthcawl but he was unable to travel because his passport had been withdrawn by the US Government because of his outspoken leftwing and anti-racist views. In October 1957 however, Robeson was able to participate in the Eisteddfod by means of a transatlantic telephone link to a secret recording studio in New York. The South Wales miners added their voice and signatures to the international petitions that eventually forced the US Supreme Court to reinstate his passport in 1958.

At a reception given in his honor by the South Wales Area National Union of Mineworkers in 1958, he told the audience, "You have shaped my life - I have learnt a lot from you. I am part of the working class. Of all the films I have made the one I will preserve in *The Proud Valley*."

The film is actually based on a real black coal miner from West Virginia who found himself working as a miner in a town in Wales.


