Mae hin, a bod (This and That)

Scientists have finally pinpointed the exact Welsh source of some of the rock believed to have been used 5,000 years ago to create Stonehenge's first stone circle. By comparing fragments at and around Stonehenge with rocks in southwest Wales, they have been able to identify the original rock outcrop that some of the Stonehenge material came from - Craig Rhos-y-Felin. By detailing the mineral content and the textural relationships within the rock, a process known as petrography, they found that 99% of the samples could be matched to rocks found in this particular set of outcrops. *Ninnau March-April 2012*

Dr. Rowan Williams, Archbishop of Canterbury, has announced he is stepping down after 10 years as the head of the Church of England and worldwide Anglican Communion. Williams, 61, was born in Ystradgynlais, Swansea, South Wales. The first Welsh Archbishop since the English Reformation, is widely praised for his attempts to maintain church unity. He has addressed issues of controversy within the church - relations with Islam, consecration of gay priests, and same-sex marriage. Williams will take the position of Master of Magdelene College at Cambridge beginning next January.

The appearance of medieval Welsh warriors

The warriors were dressed in a linen shirt (often red) and linen drawers; they covered these with a woolen cloak hanging to their knees, which was sometimes described as being "thin". Several manuscripts depict Welsh warriors as having only one shoe and their other foot bare - this probably allowed them to keep a balance on hilly or rough terrain. Hair was worn short, and was shaped around the eyes and ears; moustaches were popular, but beards were not.

Profile of artist and poet DAVID JONES (1895-1974)

David Jones was born in London, his father Welsh and his mother English. He was a major literary figure, but also one of the finest watercolorists and printmakers of his generation.

From early childhood, drawing was his constant occupation. He went to Camberwell School of Art until the outbreak of war in 1914, when he became



a private in the trenches. His experience there was to have a big impact on the remainder of his life and work. He discovered Catholicism after the war, and in 1912, he was formally received into the Catholic church after fulfilling 3 years at Westminster College of Art.

After a spell of living within a lay community in Ditching, Sussex, he move to live in another lay community at Capel-y-Fin, in the Black Mountains of Wales in 1925, and reveled in the surrounding landscape which greatly inspired him. His paintings, drawings, and etchings have metaphorical, mythical, and historical, metaphysical meanings, and reflect his Roman Catholic faith and Welsh heritage. www.artwales.com

The complete work of David Jones shows a great range - poems, paintings, engravings, and inscriptions. For him, the role of the artist, in its very basic sense, was as the role of the maker. He often signed his work David me fecit (David made me) - the importance being in the making.
