The flag of Wales

The Roman cavalry used a dragon emblem on their pennants and standards during the occupation of Britain. The Welsh kings of Aberffraw used the emblem to symbolize their authority in the early 5th century. The name Pendragon, or Pen Draig (dragon head) had its origins in these battle standards. Henry VIII used the red dragon on green and white as an emblem on Royal Navy Vessels. When the Scottish King James became James I of England, the Welsh influence waned, and the emblem did not return to the Royal Badge of Wales until 1807. In 1901, the dragon became the official symbol of Wales, and in Caernarfon in 1911, at the investiture of Edward, Prince of Wales, the flag appeared in its current form. In 1959, Queen Elizabeth II made the red dragon on a green and white background the official flag of Wales.

The flag of the United States of America

On June 14, 1777, the Marine Committee of the 2nd Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution, which stated: "Resolved, the the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; the the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation."



The Flag Resolution did not specify any particular arrangement, number of points, or orientation of the stars. The story we all know is that Betsy Ross sewed the circular star flag, from a pencil drawing given her by George Washington. It is likely that Francis Hopkinson, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, designed the 1777 flag with 13 stars in rows. He asked for a "quarter cask of the public wine" in payment; this was not paid since he was a salaried member of Congress. The star quadrant has grown to today's flag with 50 stars for the 50 states.

Romantic Message etched in Window Pane of Penrhyn Castle finally understood ...



A romantic message etched into the window pane of a castle 100 years ago has finally been deciphered. According to the Daily Mail, the message --- "essere amato amando" had mystified visitors to historic Penrhyn Castle for decades. Experts dismissed the message as jumbled Latin.


However... in October 2012, native Italian speaker Resi Tomat of the Castle staff translated the phrase to mean, "to be loved while loving." Turns out, more than 100 years ago, Lady Alice Douglas-Pennant - known as "Lady Alice" - had been banished to the castle tower when her father found out she had fallen in love with the gardener. "It was not just that the daughter of a lord should fraternize with an employee. It was a *Downton Abbey* situation where the two just don't mingle socially." According to the source, the note would have been etched when she was a teenager, about 1880. Highclere Castle, which serves as the location of PBS series *Downton Abbey*, is the real name of the home of the current Lord & Lady Carnarvon. The 5th Lord Carnarvon (1866-1923) was an Egyptologist, and led the expedition which opened the tomb of Tutankhamen. The Earl of Carnarvon name comes from the Welsh town, but the site of Highclere is Hampshire, England.


